## The Season of Easter

For Christians, unlike the rest of our society, Easter is not just one day but a 50-day period. For how can one day be enough to celebrate the great mystery of our faith? And while it can be argued that this celebration is done more than just the Easter season, it is the Easter season where it is most highlighted and celebrated. For 50 days, we celebrate and rehearse this new way of life we now have in our Risen Lord. This season begins at the sunset on the eve of Easter and ends on the Day of Pentecost (when we celebrate the birth of the Church and the gift of the Holy Spirit). It is called the “week of weeks” adapted from Jewish festivals and customs already in place. An excerpt from the *Companion to the Book of Common Worship* (Geneva Press, 2003, 117) puts it this way:

“For seven weeks, a week of Sundays, we acclaim the resurrection of Christ by the power of God. The period of seven weeks of jubilation can be traced back to its Jewish roots of the fifty days celebrated from the day after Passover to Shavuot (Feast of Weeks, Exodus 23:16). For Jews, the Feast of Weeks closed the season of harvest, which had been initiated by the Feast of Unleavened Bread. In a similar manner, early Christians observed a fifty-day period of celebration from Easter to the Day of Pentecost. To underscore the uninterrupted rejoicing of these fifty days, fasting and kneeling in prayer were forbidden at least as early as the end of the second century. On the Pentecost (“fiftieth”) day, not only was the fifty-day period concluded, but a festival with its own proper content was celebrated. The Jews observed a feast of covenant renewal and eventually commemorated the giving of the Law. Christians celebrated the gift of the Spirit as preparing the way for the day of the Lord. What Moses and the Law did for the Jewish community, the Holy Spirit now does for the community of Christ.”

Over these next few weeks, let us not just celebrate the season of Easter each Sunday, but every day. Let’s celebrate the new life springing up around us – the beautiful daffodils and tulips, the budding trees and the new leaves reaching out. Let’s celebrate the new cute chicks chirping around us, the new calves beginning to wander on their own, and even those baby ground hogs coming out to munch. But to do this, we have to be paying attention. We have to be observing the world around us and taking the time to enjoy it, to celebrate with it, to watch it grow around us. For seven weeks is a long time, certainly we will see changes as daffodils and tulips fade and make way for lilies and roses. Young birds, calves, and ground hogs will begin to grow into their more full-sized selves. Even the trees will dramatically change in seven weeks as their leaves reaching out become full. And maybe when we take the time to pay attention, we will realize our own growth as well. Our own growing and moving into living out this new life in Christ. We will realize the old parts of us we left behind, the parts of us and our past that have died and made way for the breath of the Spirit to fill us. We will realize the painful dormancy was needed to help us fully enter into this new life.

In this season of new life, let’s celebrate the journey of creation around us and ours, knowing it’s not always easy but it’s always worth it. Let’s celebrate the wonderful gift Christ gives us and creation this Easter season, the gift of new life!
