



We began our Lenten journey on Ash Wednesday, February 17<sup>th</sup>. It looked a bit different than the start of these journeys in the past. Usually, our service includes a time of remembering and reflecting – that from dust we have come and to dust we shall return. We are then marked – on our foreheads, hands, or bulletin – with ashes. But, yet again, the pandemic has forced us to become creative. For those of you who weren't able to join us, we distributed ashes in communion cups, along with a few drops of oil (this helps them to stick better) and had everyone apply their own ashes in this time of remembering and reflecting.

And, well, if I'm honest, that was an image I never before thought of, and who knows if I ever would have not needing to be creative, that is ashes in communion cups. The two seem so very far from one another. Yet, somehow, there was beauty in it, too, and perhaps a way that helps point us to Maundy Thursday and the Last Supper as we enter the Lenten journey.

For in a few weeks, we will be gathering again, and again it will look different, far from our previous Maundy Thursday services with everyone gathered around one table for an intimate service. However, we will still gather to celebrate the Lord's Supper. Maybe not with those same communion cups, but communion nonetheless. We will reflect on Jesus' last meal with his disciples and some of the last words he imparted to them. While Ash Wednesday those communion cups held the symbol of our own deaths, the communion cups on Maundy Thursday will remind us of Christ's death.

So as we continue on our Lenten journey of journeying with Jesus to Jerusalem, let us reflect not just on the scriptures, on our prayer lives, on whatever we gave up for Lent or new practice we started for Lent, let us also focus on the symbols around us. Let us focus on the ones we've always, in a sense, taken for granted. With new eyes, in the midst of creativity in a pandemic, let us see how God is still working in this world. Let us see how the Holy Spirit is still moving among us, helping us, guiding us – communion cups filled with ashes and oil, the markers of death and mourning – these same cups that hold the blood that is shed for you, for me, for the whole world. New life is possible. These words from Gungor from their song, "Beautiful Things" certainly speak truth:

"You make beautiful things  
You make beautiful things out of the dust  
You make beautiful things  
You make beautiful things out of us"

May these reflections sustain you not just the rest of this Lenten journey, but in all the ways new life is being found among the pandemic, the work of God, the love of Jesus, the healing of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

For example, one of our conversations might be regarding biggest hopes/fears for our church, another might be the role of pastor, and another focusing just on financial aspects, etc...

We do hope you join us for some, if not all, of these conversations as this is an important time in our congregation. Thank you.

## Shop with Scrip

We have an opportunity for an easy fundraiser if we have one or two people willing to be “point person.” Shop with Scrip is a similar program to our ShopRite Gift Card program, only it opens up the possibilities of over 100s of stores. Each store donates a certain percentage of each gift card sold through our organization back to our organization. For example, Amazon gives 2.25% back whereas CVS gives 6% back. Gift cards can be ordered online and emailed directly to you or ordered through a point person through the church and mailed out. This is minimal work, even for the point person or two, and could be a very easy fundraiser for our church if one or two people are able to help.
